- Texts created by AI
- Authentic poems and stories
- Vocabulary lists
- Knowledge Organisers
- Translation passages
- Song lyrics
- Letters and emails




Why read? I just want to speak with people inFrench/Spanish!

- Reading a wide variety of texts will act as a stimulus for your own writing and speaking... you'll come across new phrases and vocabulary to use yourself.
- Reading will strengthen your phonics skills, helping you to connect the spelling with the sound of new words.
- ✓ Being able to understand passages in another language can help improve literacy skills in your native language... it's true!
- ✓ Reading will introduce you to the culture of the countries where the language is spoken – its customs, traditions, values, events, history and influential people.

How does reading help speaking?

In lesson you will read aloud very often and use your developing phonics knowledge to decode the sound of even unfamiliar words. You'll use your phonics sheet to isolate the letter string you want to pronounce.



How can I improve my reading skills?

There is a whole range of strategies you can use to help you understand as much as possible from a text. Try these if you meet an unfamiliar word or phrase:

- Use the title of the writing to narrow down the context when predicting or inferring meaning.
- ⇒ Does the word look like an English word or another word you know in a different language? Test it out... does it make sense within the context? These are called cognates.
- ⇒ Remind yourself that some words are False Friends... they look like a word you know but don't mean the same thing eg] sensible = sensitive [not sensible in English].
- ⇒ If the unknow word is a verb... can you tell **who** is doing the action from the verb ending?
- ⇒ If the unknow word is a verb... can you tell in which tense the verb is conjugated?
- ⇒ Are there any time phrases to help you identify the tense of the sentence?
- ⇒ Read forwards from the unknow word, as well as backwards from it this will give you more of an idea and be more able to infer or predict.
- ➡ Translate word-for-word into 'silly English' then be willing to tweak and re-order to make more sense of what you have read.
- ⇒ Are there pictures or images that can help you?

Where can I access independent reading material?
